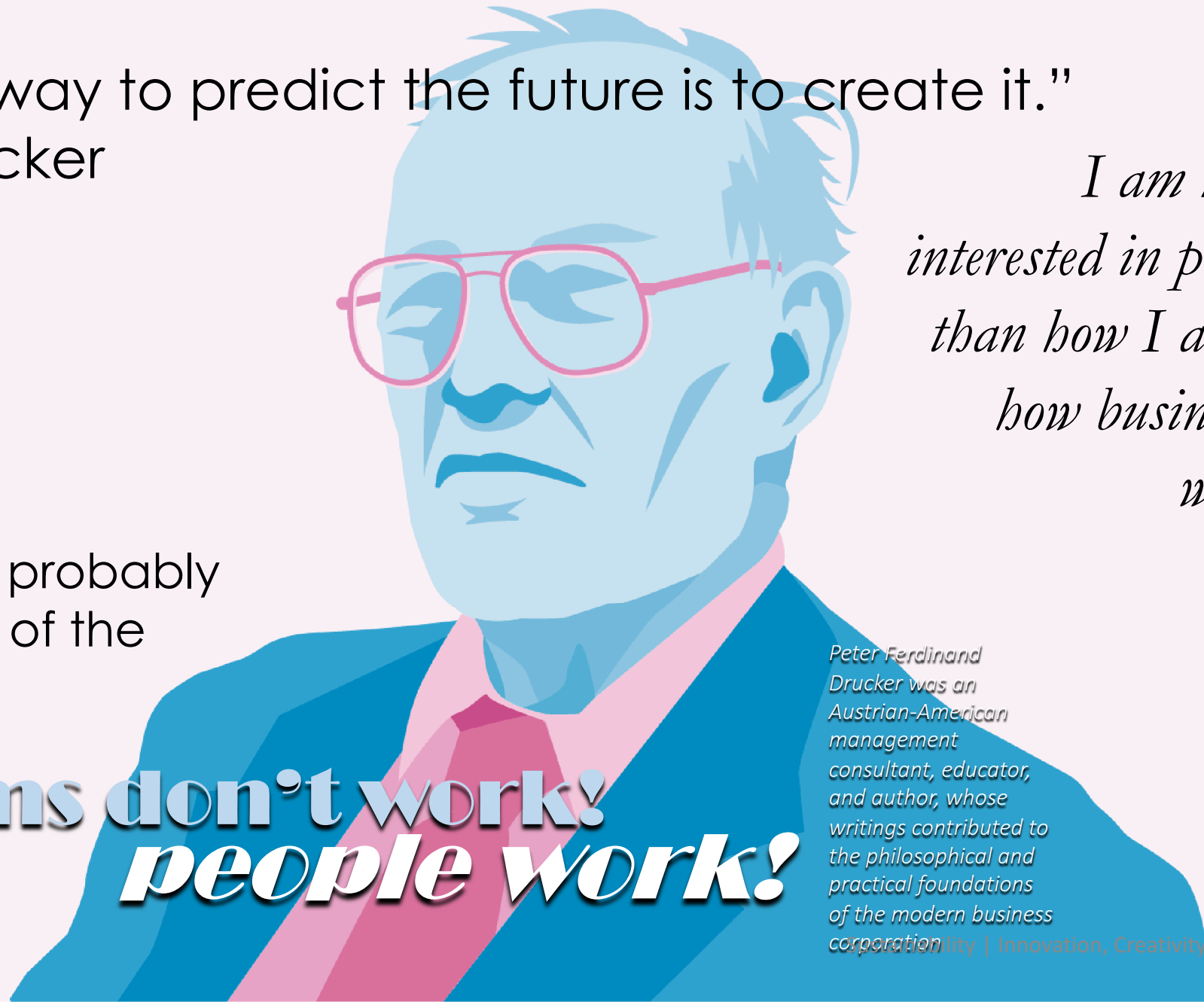

drucker-mindset

One must appreciate the historical universe of traditions and structures out of which they emerged and the cultural universe of norms and values in which they participate.

One must know about what has happened over time and the particular strengths.

One must be aware of competing economic ideologies and their underlying premises.

In short, one must be able to recognize major shifts in human aspirations as well as the fixed limits of human adaptation



Then, too, one must be sensitive to the speed, direction, and logic of those technological and demographic changes that will make the future very different from the present.

One must, at the same time, carefully ascertain what in the present will last. Not least, one must supplement an understanding of management with insights from other fields of knowledge, regularly comparing it with the summary experience of other large-scale organizations and different cultures.

This can help us in articulating our understanding of sustainability and our commitment (or not) to achieving it.

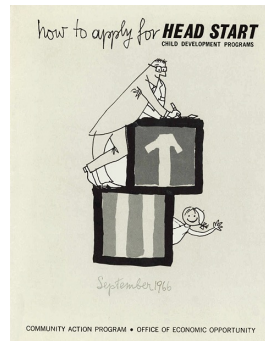
The Economic Opportunity Act of 1964 is enacted and includes programs such as: Job Corps, Urban/Rural Community Action, VISTA, Project Head Start and many more.

1964

War on Poverty: On Jan. 8, President Lyndon Johnson takes up the cause of building a "Great Society" by declaring "War on Poverty" in his first State of the Union Address. The goal of the War on Poverty is to eradicate the causes of poverty by creating job opportunities, increasing productivity, and enhancing the quality of life.

1965

"Recommendations for a Head Start Program": On February 19, 1965, a panel of experts produced a report entitled, "Recommendations for a Head Start Program: Improving the Opportunity and Achievements of the Children of the Poor."



1967

Infants and toddlers: The Parent and Child Centers demonstration project is established. It offers Head Start services to families with children birth to 3. This program eventually becomes Early Head Start, first funded in 1995.

Multicultural Principles: The Head Start Bureau publishes the Multicultural Principles for Head Start Programs. Its purpose is to stand as a challenge for programs to focus efforts on individualizing services so that every child and family feels respected and values, and is able to grow in accepting and appreciating different. These principles are revisited and updated in 2010.

four types of innovation that stand out and seem to be
the consensus among organizations looking for a
groundbreaking idea, concept, or product.

*1. Sustaining, or
incremental innovation
(continuous improvement)*

Sustaining innovation occurs when both the problem and the domain it exists in are well defined. It refers to when a company constantly makes small improvements on its products to sell them at higher prices to its best customers in order to sustain its competitive advantage and position as a market leader in an existing market.

Moreover, incremental innovation is an especially participative approach engaging staff, partners, community members as development leaders building a collective culture of improvement.



2. Breakthrough innovation

Breakthrough innovation is a kind of radical innovation that occurs when the problem you are trying to solve is well-defined, but the domain it exists in is still only operating at part of its potential.

3. Disruptive innovation

Disruptive innovation occurs when a new product offering transforms the market it enters into.

The Ford Model T is a good example: it wasn't designed to compete with the expensive cars owned by the wealthy elite, but to target a new segment of lower-income customers. **It began as a low-end disruption targeting a new market and totally disrupted the automobile industry.**

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4. *Basic research*

Basic research refers to **the discovery of a new phenomenon that enables new problem solving techniques.**
