


Every year, approximately 800 women die from preventable causes related to pregnancy and childbirth.

U.S. Maternal Mortality Statistics

- In 2015 ranked 50th globally with its maternal mortality rate.
- 1 of 8 countries with a continually rising mortality rate.
- The estimated maternal mortality rate in the United States increased by approximately 26% from 2000-2014.



The US now ranks 55th in the world for maternal mortality.




Despite being ranked 1st in \$ spent on maternity care.

Black Women are....

4x more likely to die from pregnancy or childbirth complications than White women: 42.8% of Black women per 100,000 live births, as opposed to 12.5% of White women and 17.3% of women of other races.


Racial Disparities in Childbirth




OUR MISSION

STEP 2: ADVOCATE





- Advocate for policies that promote improved maternal health and safe motherhood.
- Raise awareness and build commitment to maternal health among leaders and decision makers.
- Address barriers to access posed by gender and poverty.
- Introduce social accountability mechanisms to enable communities to hold government and providers accountable for the quality and availability of maternal health services.

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
