





Native American denounces Indian bills, sterilization



An 80 performance of "The Longest Walk" in Washington, D.C. Native Americans are alarmed at a recent surge of what they call anti-Indian legislation being introduced in the U.S. Congress. Brightman said the specifically cited is the sterilization of young Indian women. "The doctors would tell them 'you can always get another operation and have it reversed.' And that's lie." The women, a Cho-pawa-Crow Indian, was raised on a reservation in Montana.

Pregnant Native American women were singled out for COVID-19 testing based on their race and ZIP code, clinicians say. While awaiting results, some mothers were separated from their newborns, depriving them of the immediate contact doctors recommend.



Mental Health + Reproductive Care

Black women in the United States
are **3 to 4 times more likely to die***
from pregnancy complications.

THIS IS PROBLEMATIC

Regardless of socioeconomic status, Black women are less likely to obtain quality care. Without appropriate intervention, Black women will continue to experience unacceptably poor maternal health outcomes.






