As this project is focused on youth substance use, it combines a hard-to-reach population with the challenges of evaluating a stigmatized experience such as identifying or developing data collection tools that encapsulate specific information from each community.

## **Boston Public Health Commission- HIV Division**

The changing landscape of local public health in Boston presents an opportunity for BPHC to conduct a more nuanced and comprehensive assessment of the state of HIV in Boston, specifically with a focus on understanding key risk factors for HIV transmission, how BPHC prioritizes equity in its current approach, and the gaps in HIV prevention and treatment.

The ACES team is conducting a needs assessment that will allow BPHC to understand the current unmet needs more fully in addressing HIV in Boston, review how internal and external resources are aligned and distributed for maximum benefit, and take into consideration and build on existing Suffolk County HIV strategic plans. This work will also compliment, inform, and where appropriate, collaborate with any internal strategic planning process for the Bureau.
